

Counselor's Corner January, 2018

TOPIC OF THE MONTH

Great Careers Without a 4-year Degree

Did you know that you could obtain a great job without the need of 4-5 years of college and the 4 or 5 years of debt that may come along with it? With the cost to attend college skyrocketing, and the amount of financial aid decreasing, it may be wise to look at all the options that you have available to you once you graduate from high school. Many careers require some sort of postsecondary education or training to be successful, but not all require 4 years of it. Here are a few jobs that you can obtain that have great salaries, but you won't have to go to college for 4 years.

Dental Hygienist – Both an associate's degree in dental hygiene from an accredited program and state certification are the minimum requirements.

Annual Median Salary: \$70,210 Projected Hiring Outlook: 22%

Electric Power-Line Installer – An apprenticeship, typically lasting up to 5 years, is the common starting point for electrical power-line installer. Not only do apprenticeships help you skip the cost of college, these training positions actually pay an average starting salary of \$45,000 a year.

Annual Median Salary: 64,168 Projected Hiring Outlook: 13.7%

Plumber – You can begin your career in plumbing right out of high school with a four or five year paid apprenticeship, in which you'll typically earn 30% to 50% of what fully trained plumbers make. Master plumbers a license in most states.

Annual Median Salary: \$48,194 Projected Hiring Outlook: 17.6%

Multimedia Artist – The Bureau of Labor Statistics recommends a bachelor's degree for becoming a multimedia artist, however, it's not a requirement and several trade schools offer programs specializing in multimedia art. Plus, a notable 57% of those working as multimedia artists are self-employed.

Annual Median Salary: 61,370 Projected Hiring Outlook: 6%

Commercial Pilot – Flight training is necessary, extensive and expensive. You need to get a private pilot's license, which requires a minimum of 40 hours of flight time. Then you have to log 250 hours to get a commercial pilot's license. You must also get additional licenses for instrument, multi-engine and other ratings, as well as pass periodic medical exams and renew your licenses throughout your career.

Annual Median Salary: \$73,528 Projected Hiring Outlook: 15%

Paralegal Assistant – Entry-level paralegal assistants are required to have an associate's degree in paralegal studies from an accredited program. Those working toward this certification can work on-the-job as interns.

Annual Median Salary: \$46,990 Projected Hiring Outlook: 7%

Registered Nurse – According to BLS, two ways in which a registered nurse can begin his/her career without receiving a four-year college degree is by earning "an associate's degree in nursing or a diploma from an approved nursing program." Once reaching this level of education, additional credentials as dictated by individual state are required.

Annual Median Salary: \$65,470 Projected Hiring Outlook: 19%

Respiratory Therapist – Programs for training and certification in respiratory therapy exist throughout the country. Anyone trying to become a respiratory therapist must be certified by the National Board for Respiratory Care.

Annual Median Salary: \$55,870 Projected Hiring Outlook: 19%

Web Developer – Training in various web-building disciplines is required for aspiring web developers. This includes HTML, CSS, JavaScript and other coding techniques, as well as some graphic design. Most can be obtained through associate's programs.

Annual Median Salary: \$62,500 Projected Hiring Outlook: 20%

Computer Service Technician – The BLS reports that educational requirements for aspiring computer support technicians can vary depending on the nature and level of work. A high school diploma with applicable experience can suffice in some instances.

Annual Median Salary: \$48,900 Projected Hiring Outlook: 17%

Office Support Supervisor – You can get started in entry-level clerical and administrative positions straight out of high school if you have basic office and computer skills. On the job training and relevant classes at a technical school or community college can add to your resume.

Annual Median Salary: \$50,211 Projected Hiring Outlook: 12.4%

Mental Health and Awareness:

Did you know that suicide is the second leading cause of death among school-aged youth? Were you aware that suicide rates have increased 128% for our children ages 10-14 since the 1980's? Loss of a loved one, friend, neighbor, colleague, or other acquaintance to suicide is devastating. Importantly, there is hope and help for persons contemplating suicide, and you can help others in need. **QPR** stands for **Question**, **Persuade**, and **Refer** -- 3 simple steps that anyone can learn to help save a life from suicide. Just as people trained in CPR and the Heimlich Maneuver help save thousands of lives each year, people trained in QPR learn how to recognize the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to question, persuade, and refer someone to help. Parents, teachers, and friends are in a key position to notice these signs and help our children.

As a QPR-trained Gatekeeper, trainees receive background on the prevalence of suicide and learn to

- recognize the warning signs of suicide
- know how to offer hope
- know how to get help and save a life

Our school counseling department will be offering free suicide prevention training in February through Child Focus. QPR will be offered to staff and students on February 21 during FLEx and for parents and community members on February 21 from 6:30-8:30PM in the MP Room. Please join us as we learn valuable life-saving skills.
