Pianist, professor credits Indian Hill teachers and arts programs for the life and career he has today



A round the age of five, Ben Cook began playing the piano. His grandmother, a renowned composer of Jewish children's music, was the one who taught him to play.

With this firm foundation beneath him, Cook was able to flourish in music courses at Indian Hill under exemplary teachers like Joe Gaudio and Steve Strider.

"Mr. Gaudio, who was a renowned jazz tenor saxophonist, was a great inspiration for me and fostered my development, eventually exposing me to the world of jazz, mostly on the piano. I continued in the band program through middle school and joined the middle school jazz ensemble as pianist in sixth or seventh grade. It was there that I first began to develop the skills to play piano professionally."

In high school concert band, Gaudio and Strider continued challenging Cook to grow and provided him with opportunities to learn jazz.

At the end of his senior year in 1988, Cook had his first professional gig playing in a show band at Kings Island.

Over the years, Cook has traveled across the United States and Japan performing as a pianist with the Boston Pops Orchestra.

Now, he's is an associate professor at Berklee College of Music, carrying on the gift of teaching that he received from his grandmother and Indian Hill faculty.

"Without the dedication of those Indian Hill teachers and the arts programs they created, I would certainly not have the life and career I have today," Cook said.



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Four-time All-American sits down with IHHS Student Athlete Connor Wilkes

n 2017, Anna Podojil led her Braves soccer team to their first Ohio Division II state title, scoring 38 of what would become a record breaking 112 career goals.

When Podojil graduated in 2019, it was clear that her soccer career was just getting started.

She went on to play for the University of Arkansas, where she was SEC Freshman of the Year (2019), SEC Forward of the Year (2020), and a Four-time All American.

In January 2024, she was the 35th overall pick in the National Women's Soccer League draft, selected by Washington Spirit.

Podojil came back to The Hill for a quick Q&A with Connor Wilkes, IHHS '25, to talk what being a Brave and leadership means to her.

Wilkes is also an All-American who led the Indian Hill mens soccer team through an undefeated season as senior captain.

He has an incredibly promising future ahead of him—in January, Wilkes committed to furthering his academic and soccer career at Johns Hopkins University.

Connor Wilkes (CW): What does leadership mean to you?

Anna Podojil (AP): Being a good leader is just showing up every day, being yourself and just being a good teammate. You're going to gain so much respect ... being respectful to your coaches, all of your friends, and then showing those same skills off the field and in the classroom.

CW: What does being a Brave mean to you?

AP: I feel so proud to be a Brave. Obviously now coming back, we have all these new facilities. I'm just super proud of how much they pour into this school, all of the students, all of the athletes... we have a great community... I think I've created such long lasting relationships at this school which I think is really special.

A LIFE FULL OF GIVING IHHS 1974 grad Dr. Carter Randolph gives to the community that shaped him

This was the greatest

to find the truth

In addition to being President, Chief Investment Officer at The Randolph Company, a wealth management firm, Dr. Carter Randolph is extremely involved with the community.

He serves on multiple boards, including the Greenacres Foundation, an education-based non-profit located within Indian Hill.

The Greenacres Foundation and the Indian Hill School District partnered in the 2017-2018 school year.

That's when two students produced a documentary on a Greenacres farm restoration project that went up for two awards.

The foundation was so impressed by what the students created that Dr. Randolph, on behalf of the foundation, personally delivered a PTZ Robotic Camera and accessories for students involved with

the Indian Hill Television Network (IHTN) to use.

It's clear that giving back is important for Dr. Randolph, and so is living each day like it's your last.

Unfortunately, there were students who passed away during Mr. Randolph's time at IHHS. Early on this

> gave him the perspective that each day is valuable and has a little sense of urgency.

lesson of education—dissent Randolph notes that his time at Indian Hill as a student also taught him dissent and to challenge things you're told.

> "The earth was flat and for 1,200 years and anyone who said otherwise was killed. This led me to never accept anything," Dr. Randolph said. "This was the greatest lesson of education—dissent to find the truth because today's truth is based on today's rose colored glasses and the shade of rose changes every day."



Trott invested time in trying new experiences at IHHS. She took marketing classes and was involved with clubs like Mock Trial and DECA—all of which were eye opening opportunities, as both of her parents were healthcare professionals.

The story of her success today starts with the opportunities she had as a student at Indian Hill.

When Trott graduated and stepped onto campus at Miami University, she was asked to join its entrepreneurship program. She recalled liking DECA as an IHHS student, and because of that experience decided to pursue an entrepreneurship pathway.

Professors along the way turned into mentors, one of which encouraged her to apply for a job at the company she still works at today.

Ultimately Trott recognizes the value of mentors, and the impact they can have on your life personally and professionally. "You have to seek [mentors] out and earn their

respect," Trott said. "Once you do, once you find those valuable mentors ... they're kind of life long friends even when you do 'grow up.'"

Trott encourages students to take advantage of all the state-of-the-art opportunities Indian Hill has to offer, like the Indian Hill Entrepreneurs' Center that

> opened in September 2024. The Center allows students K-12 to gain hands-on business experience and have access to mentorship opportunities from business leaders.

"Think about what a career in business could look like because that could help you take next steps to define your college experience," Trott said.

The "Golden Arches" are iconic for a reason: 69 million people fed daily; 43,000 restaurants in over 100 countries; one CEO in charge. Meet Chris Kempczinski, the chief executive officer of McDonald's Corporation and proud Indian Hill High School graduate (shout out to the Class of 1987).

Despite his business commitments, Kempczinski continues to carve out time for investing in the lives of students and the district.

In 2020, Kempczinski surprised the IHHS graduating class with a recorded video message. He expressed how proud he was of the senior class, shared life lessons related to optimism and resiliency, and acknowledged that graduates "should really feel confident and grateful for the foundation that [they've] gotten from Indian Hill."

In 2022, Kempczinski was awarded the Distinguished Alumni Award from the Indian Hill Foundation. The award honors and recognizes the alumni legacy of commitment, integrity, and achievement. Kempczinski and all recipients of the award are an inspiration and exemplify what it means to 'be Brave' in the years beyond high school.

Most recently, Kempczinski sat down with Mia Sulfsted, IHHS '26, to share about his path to successful leadership. Kempczinski and Sulfsted also had time to enjoy a delicious McDonald's lunch.

We know you're wondering—what does Kempczinski order from McDonald's?

He keeps it simple with a McChicken (no mayo, add cheese), a small order of McDonald's World Famous Fries (with ketchup, of course) and a Sprite Zero to drink.







Mia Sulfsted (MS): What was the most important feedback you got in your career and how did it shape you as a leader?

Chris Kempczinski (CK): I've gotten a lot of feedback in my career. One of the things I got early on... the person I was working for said ... the most important brand you are ever going to manage is the Chris Kempczinski brand. That struck home for me because when you think about it, your reputation is much like a brand.

How others perceive you, how you manage your brand, that, in my career, I found that to be a great piece of advice.

MS: If you were able to talk to your high school self, what advice would you give yourself?

CK: If I could talk to my high school self I would probably say two things. One, don't think you can plan everything out. I remember when I was in high school it was OK where am I going to go to college, what am I going to major in, it was sort of like every step along the way I felt I needed to have it planned out and the reality is that's not how life works. There are lots of things and twists and turns that you can't plan. The other thing that I would advise my younger self is stop being in a hurry. ... I didn't always enjoy as much of what I was in because I was always thinking about 'what's the next thing.'

MS: Did you have any specific moments or an epiphany that made you a leader yourself?

CK: Not really, part of it is it just happens over time. ... The biggest thing I've had to learn about being a leader is it's all about how you work through other people. ... Most of what I do is I try to do it through other people. Learning how to get results and drive things through other people is what a leader ends up being all about.

Your reputation is much like a brand.

... I assumed early on when I was a leader that everyone was like me. So the same things that motivated me would motivate them. What you learn over time is people are motivated by different things. ... Part of being a leader is to find what are those things that actually matter most to other people and how you connect the work you need to do to what matters to them. ...

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
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
